You can't say the word Windsor without conjuring up images of the world's oldest and largest inhabited castle, royalty, horseracing, changing the guard, the River Thames and Eton College. Windsor thrives on its royal patronage, rich cultural heritage, stunning architecture and beautiful natural scenery. Add to this an abundance of quaint one-of-a-kind shops and a culinary scene headed by the likes of Heston Blumenthal and you'll have a reasonable idea of the treats in store for you in Windsor.

DAY ONE

With almost 1,000 years of history to discover, 13 acres (5 hectares) of buildings including the magnificent State Apartments, Queen Mary's Dolls' House and St George's Chapel you need at least two hours at Windsor Castle. It doesn't matter how many times you've visited before there's always something new to see or experience. From Conquer the Tower tours to summer band concerts and visits to the Moat Garden this iconic attraction has to be top of your must-visit list.

Time your visit so that you can catch the Changing the Guard ceremony that takes place in Lower Ward. This is the only place outside London where you can see this colourful display whilst listening to the military band.

Relax after lunch on a gentle 40-minute cruise along the River Thames as it meanders past famous sites such as Eton College Chapel and Royal Windsor Racecourse. On a fine day you'll feel like royalty and enjoy spectacular views of Windsor Castle from the Long Walk during a horse-drawn carriage ride. The carriages are available from the top of the Long Walk and tours take you away from the hustle and bustle of the town into Windsor Great Park.

Take a stroll over the bridge to the opposite bank of the Thames into Eton with its world-famous school. Eton is an eclectic mix of traditional and contemporary retail bringing together antiques and modern art, traditional medicines and complementary beauty therapies, English roast dinners and fine European cuisine. The mile-long high street leading down to Eton College boasts a fine selection of independent retailers and gives you a sense of stepping back in time when you see the boys in their traditional school dress. Follow The Eton Walkway to discover 18 fascinating points of interest around the town. Pick up a free guide at the Royal Windsor Information Centre before you set off.

Round off your day with a visit to Windsor's Theatre
Royal or one of two fantastic arts centres in the borough –
Norden Farm or The Old Court. They all offer a programme
of drama, comedy, music, dance and film so check online
for details of what's on during your stay.



DAY TWO

If you love exploring on foot book a professional Blue Badge Guide through the Royal Windsor Information Centre. Nobody knows Windsor quite like they do and they'll bring the town's history alive with their amazing insights.

For a fun way to experience Windsor and Eton jump on The Original Tour. Your ticket is valid for 24 hours and there are 11 hop-on hop-off stops along the way allowing you to get off and explore the places that interest you. Or head to the Duck Stop outside the Theatre Royal to catch the Duck Tour, an amphibious vehicle that takes you on a circular tour of the town on road and water.

The Savill Garden provides a wealth of beauty and interest in all seasons and is the perfect place to unwind and enjoy the natural environment. The world-renowned 35 acres offer ornamental gardens and woodland including National Collections and rare international species.

TOP TIPS to make the most of your break

- If you're looking for the finest culinary experience head to Bray, less than 6 miles from Windsor town centre, for Michelin star heaven at The Waterside Inn and The Fat Duck. Avoid disappointment by booking at least three months in advance. Alternatively you can book one of Blumenthal's other restaurants in the same village The Hinds Head or The Crown at Bray.
- Extend your weekend and stay for a Monday night race meeting (from April to October) at Royal Windsor Racecourse. The perfect place to be on a summer's evening and so easy to get there with riverboat shuttles running between the town and racecourse throughout the evening.
- Enjoy Evensong in St George's Chapel, one of England's most beautiful ecclesiastical buildings. It's free of charge for all and a truly wonderful experience in a magnificent setting.
- Pick up a loyalty card from the Visitor Information
 Centre to get discounts in the shops and restaurants within Windsor Royal Station.
- Go and see the team at the Visitor Information Centre for up-to-the-minute advice on what's on, what's open and what's on offer!

02 | 48 Hours in Windsor & Eton

It may seem surprising but the town of Windsor is considerably older than the castle. It dates from the 7th century with royal ownership probably from the 9th. At first Windsor was located three miles away but moved to its current site before 1110, changing its name to New Windsor. So much has happened in Windsor's 1000 year history. Here's a selection of not-to-be-missed locations to help you discover more of this wonderful little town and its close neighbour Eton.

HENRY VIII GATEWAY

The symbolic link between castle and town, originally there was a moat and drawbridge. Today the great oak gates are secured with a heavy bar against the cobblestones when closed. Henry VIII built his gateway in about 1511. The panel above the archway displays heraldic badges of the king, with the pomegranate of Queen Catherine of Aragon, his first wife.

GUILDHALL ISLAND

Windsor proved to be a successful new town and by the late 13th century the temporary market stalls were replaced by permanent shops covering the area now known as Guildhall Island. The medieval market place was not a gentile place: its streets were unpaved until the 18th century and it was dirty with putrid air owing to its many noxious trades. Fish sellers occupied Fish Street, now Church Street, and the town's slaughterhouses and butchers were located near the present day Guildhall. The medieval town also had a "red light" street located behind the market place. Only the poorest people lived in this area while the wealthy lived on Peascod Street.

GUILDHALL

Designed by Sir Thomas Fitz and built in 1691 Windsor Guildhall replaced the first guildhall built in c.1360 which faced the castle gates. By the late 17th century the royal preference was for newer palaces closer to London, such as Hampton Court or Whitehall, with the result that Windsor Castle was ignored and neglected. This was a disaster for the town, as its economy was based on the castle. The commissioning of a new guildhall, which the town could barely afford, was an attempt to breathe new life into its economy.



MARKET CROSS HOUSE

This strangely leaning 18th-century building, previously a butcher's shop, then a beer shop, demonstrates the advantages of timber framed buildings. If it had been built of brick it would have fallen down years ago!

PEASCOD STREET

Literally Peapod Street, makes reference to the area's pea fields and the favourite medieval snack of buttered pea pods, probably sold on this street from the 12th century.

QUEEN VICTORIA STATUE

The statue was presented to the town to mark her Golden Jubilee in 1887. Victoria was particularly associated with Windsor because following the castle's renovation between 1820-40 it became her principle residence. The renewed presence of the royal court in Windsor brought new prosperity and, linked with the arrival of the railways in 1851, the town was largely rebuilt accounting for its appearance today.

IRISH GUARD STATUE

Unveiled by the Duke of Cambridge, Colonel of the Irish Guards, in 2011, the statue depicts a solider in modern combat gear and body armour, as used in Afghanistan. The 6ft figure was sculpted by former Army officer Mark Jackson, using bronze from statues salvaged during the conflict in Iraq. It stands on a plinth surrounded by cobbles from Afghanistan. The Irish Guards were stationed at Victoria Barracks in Windsor. They suffered three casualties during a six month tour of Afghanistan.

LONG WALK

The great ceremonial route from the castle to Windsor Great Park, stretching 2.65 miles to the Copper Horse, the equestrian memorial to George III. Originally laid out by Charles II in 1685, it was an avenue of oak and elm trees used by the King for walking and hunting stag in the Great Park. Queen Anne added the central carriageway in 1710. Jeffry Wyatville redesigned it in 1824 as a ceremonial route to the castle. State visit processions enter the castle via Park Street and the Long Walk.

CENTRAL STATION

The Great Western Railway links Windsor to Slough as it has done since 1849. When it was built it made a huge difference to the people of Windsor since they could now live in the town and travel to London each day for work. Queen Victoria frequently travelled by train, having become, in 1842, the first monarch ever to take a train ride. She didn't enjoy the experience as much as the Prince Consort. It was leaving the station in March 1882 that a deranged man tried to shoot her. The station building as you see it today was completed in 1897 to celebrate Queen Victoria's Diamond Jubilee.

CURFEW TOWER

Originally called Clewer Tower and later Bell Tower it stands within Windsor Castle and can be seen from Thames Street. It was built between 1227 and 1230 to buttress the castle's defences following a siege during the reign of King John. It's one of the oldest parts of Lower Ward with walls 13 feet thick and 100 feet high. The tower contains a dungeon where prisoners were held and executed. The bodies of traitors were hung from the battlement as a warning to miscreant townsfolk. The remains of a sally port tunnel beneath the High Street also survive. This was means of escape should the castle be sieged but was never used as far as we know.

The Curfew Tour also houses the bells of St George's Chapel, held within a massive medieval timber frame, originally planned as a spire for the chapel but never installed. Three times a day, at 09:00, 12:00 and 18:00, the chapel bells chime the tune of St David's.

WINDSOR BRIDGE

This iron bridge, connecting Windsor to Eton across the River Thames, was built in 1822 and replaced a succession of timber bridges dating from c. 1170. In the 12th century bridges were both rare and costly. Windsor Bridge was important because it brought trade to Windsor's market, underpinning the new town's economy. River and road tolls were collected at the bridge until the 19th century and claimed by the crown until the 16th. Royal processions from Westminster to Windsor passed along Eton High Street, over Windsor Bridge to the castle, one of the most famous being the funeral in 1537 of Jane Seymour, the third (and favourite) wife of Henry VIII.

RED POST BOX, ETON HIGH STREET

Near The Cockpit at 47-49 Eton High Street you'll find a rare pillar box dating from 1856. Still used today it was made by Smith and Hawkes Eagle Foundry in Birmingham and is one of only 10 surviving. Its unusual vertical slot for posting letters and fluted Doric decoration illustrates where the name "pillar" came from. Earlier postboxes were painted green, to blend in with their surroundings, but people kept walking into them! And another claim to fame - Eton was the first village in England to have a post office.



THE HERSCHEL OBSERVATORY, ETON

Sir William Herschel was King George III's astronomer, the first such appointment and probably the most famous of the 18th century. On March 13 1781 Herschel discovered Uranus. The remarkable feat was achieved through mapping the sky at night with his sister, Caroline, whilst he was sitting in the garden of his house in Bath, now Herschel Museum of Astronomy. He was given a royal appointment as astronomer and an income of £200 for his discovery and so moved to Herschel House in Slough to be closer to court in London. He was the first astronomer to correctly describe the spiral structure of our Milky Way Galaxy. In 1800 he also discovered Infrared. Clever man!

THE QUEEN'S WALKWAY

A self-guided walking trail covering 6.3km, connecting 63 of Windsor's most significant attractions. It was designed by The Outdoor Trust, in partnership with local people, to recognise the moment on 9th September 2015 when Her Majesty The Queen had reigned for 63 years and more than 7 months to become Britain's longest reigning monarch. Pick up your free guide from the Visitor Information Centre and explore this historic town.

THE ETON WALKWAY

A 2-mile, circular walking tour connecting 18 points of interest in this famous little town. Starting at Windsor Bridge it celebrates Eton's diverse community and rich heritage. Free guides are available from the Visitor Information Centre.

Eight free things to see and do in the Royal Borough



See the Guards March

Windsor Castle Guard marches up Windsor High Street to Windsor Castle from Victoria Barracks daily from April to July and alternative days from August to March (except Sundays) at 10.50am usually accompanied by a military band. The best viewing point is the Com-Exchange at the famous Windsor Guildhall. The Guard Changing Ceremony takes place inside Windsor Castle and requires payment of the entry fee.



Explore Maidenhead Heritage Centre

Maidenhead's history ranges from the Romans to racing cars. The Air Transport Auxiliary collection is of national importance. There is a programme of exhibitions and regular lunchtime lectures (second Tuesday of the month). Browse photo albums and discover Maidenhead life in the 'good old days'.

Stroll along The Long Walk and through Windsor Great Park

Charles II created the three-mile-long Long Walk from the castle leading into the Great Park. The Great Park, part of a vast Norman hunting chase, is set in 2.020 hectares (5.000 acres) of countryside stretching from Windsor Castle to the north and Ascot to the south. The varied landscape and sweeping deer lawns, woods, coverts and huge solitary ancient oaks means the park is alive with wildlife




Attend Evensong at St George's Chapel

The service lasts approximately 45 minutes and is beautifully sung by the Chapel Choir, one of the leading church choirs in the country. They perform Evensong at 5.15pm (sung every day except Wednesdays).

Visit St John's Parish Church

In the shadow of Windsor Castle, Windsor Parish Church is open 7 days a week and contains a beautiful painting of the Last Supper. Of unknown origin, the painting is considered a National Treasure; it was given by George III following alterations to the royal chapel and was restored in 2003.



The Queen's Walkway

63 gunmetal plagues marked with HM The Queen's personal royal cypher connect this walking trail around 63 of Windsor's finest sights. Pick up a free map and leaflet at the Visitor Information Centre or download the app before you set off.

Walk the Riverside

Escorted by the Royal Boatmen, the Royal Family once used the Thames to travel between royal palaces, It's less common these day to see royals on the river, but walks along the Thames Path are not to be missed. Start from Old Windsor, and once past the weir at Old Windsor Lock, cross Albert Bridge for a detour into the village of Datchet - you'll soon return over Victoria Bridge into Home Park, with picture-postcard views of both Windsor Castle and Eton.

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Windsor Castle Frogmore House

Founded by William the Conqueror in the 11th century, Windsor Castle is the oldest and largest occupied castle in the world and is open to visitors year-round. The Castle has been the home of 39 monarchs, and today The Queen spends most of her private weekends at the Castle.



Each monarch has made their own personal mark on the Castle and their legacy can be seen throughout, from the late medieval St George's Chapel to the Tudor houses of Lower Ward, from Charles II's baroque remodelling of the State Apartments to the exquisite Gothic interiors of the Semi-State Rooms, rebuilt for George IV. The fire of 1992 gave the Castle a new legacy, including the superb new interior to the historic St George's Hall and in 2002 the Jubilee Garden was added to celebrate the Golden Jubilee of Her Majesty The Queen.

More recently. George IV's Inner Hall has been revealed to visitors for the first time in 150 years. Created by George IV in the 1820s as a space to receive official guests, the hall has been restored and now, for the first time since its closure by George's niece Queen Victoria, serves its original purpose as a magnificent welcome area for visitors to the Castle.

The opening of the Inner Hall also reinstates the sequence of spaces linking the visitor entrance on the North Terrace with the State Entrance on the south side and the uninterrupted view across the ground floor of the Castle. For the first time, visitors can see the State Entrance, where guests of Her Majesty The Queen are welcomed to Windsor, and enjoy the spectacular view of the two-and-a-halfmile Long Walk, created by Charles II in the 1680s.

The Castle remains an important venue for ceremonial visits from heads of state of other countries. It is also home to some of the greatest paintings and works of art in the Royal Collection, which are displayed throughout the Castle's splendid interiors.







TheHistory of Windsor Castle

The Castle is the largest inhabited castle in the world and is the oldest royal residence to have remained in continuous use by the monarchs of Britain. The Castle covers an area of about 5 hectares (13 acres) and contains, as well as a royal palace, a magnificent collegiate church and the homes or workplaces of many people. In many ways, the Castle embodies the history of the nation in its development from an early fortification to the royal palace we see today.

The earliest part of the structure is the artificial earthen mound in the middle, which was raised c.1070 by William the Conqueror. It supports the Round Tower built by Henry II, who adapted a purely defensive fortification as a residence by building the first royal apartments on the north side of the Upper Ward. The Upper Ward was converted into a huge Gothic palace by a

succession of medieval kings, notably Edward III in the 14th-century. He also founded the Order of the Garter and the associated College of St George in the Lower Ward. Edward IV built the present St George's Chapel in the 15th-century.

Charles II reconstructed the State Apartments in Baroque taste in the 1670s, and the whole of the Upper Ward was reconstructed to its present picturesque Gothic appearance and the Round Tower heightened by George IV in the 1820s.

He was also responsible for acquiring much of the magnificent art collection which now fills the rooms of the Castle. Following a serious fire in 1992, a new roof was designed for St George's Hall, and the adjoining Lantern Lobby and the Private Chapel were rebuilt in the modern Gothic style.

Visiting the Castle

(We recommend you allow 2 to 3 hours for your visit)

Windsor Castle is one of the major homes of the Royal Collection, where incomparable works of art are displayed in the historic setting for which they were collected or commissioned by successive monarchs. Pictures and works of art are also frequently lent to exhibitions all over the world, so the arrangement may vary from time to time. Visitors are also able to visit St George's Chapel. On Sundays, the Chapel is only open to worshippers.

Queen Mary's Dolls' House is a masterpiece in miniature, created by the architect Sir Edwin Lutyens for Queen Mary and given to the nation in 1923. The house is built on a 1 to 12 scale and took three years to complete, involving the work of 1,500 tradesmen, including leading artists of the day. Every item is perfectly manufactured, each room is exquisitely furnished, and every piece made exactly to scale. Working lifts stop at every floor; there is running water in all five bathrooms and electricity throughout the house.

The State Apartments, the magnificent formal rooms used for Court ceremonial, State and official occasions, range from the smaller intimate rooms of Charles II's private apartments to the extravagance of the Waterloo Chamber, built to celebrate the famous victory over the French in 1815. Magnificent ceilings by Antonio Verrio and fine woodwork by Grinling Gibbons complement masterpieces by Holbein, Rubens and Van Dyck and glorious tapestries by Gobelins. A new display which tells the story of 'The British Monarchy and the World' has also gone on show in the State Apartments. Including more than 250 objects, the selection spans works of art from every continent and from every reign from George III to Her Majesty The Queen.

The Semi-State Rooms were created by George IV in the 1820s as part of a new series of royal apartments for his personal occupation. Damaged in the 1992 fire, they have been restored to their original appearance and contain furniture and works of art chosen by George IV. These rooms are only open at certain times of year; please check Royal Collection Trust's website for further details: www.rct.uk.

St George's Chapel is one of the most beautiful ecclesiastical buildings in England. It is the chapel of the Most Noble Order of the Garter, Britain's highest order of chivalry founded by Edward III in 1348. Members are selected by The Sovereign and include foreign monarchs and previous Prime Ministers. In June 2008 Prince William became the 1000th Garter Knight. Ten monarchs are buried in the Chapel including Edward IV himself, Henry VIII and Charles I. The Chapel was also the setting for the wedding of TRH The Duke and Duchess of Sussex.

Guided tours to the top of Windsor Castle's world-famous Round Tower are available for individuals in the summer, while groups can book the special visits 'Restoring Windsor: The Castle After the Fire', and 'Royal Weddings at Windsor'. For an extra special visit, you can also book an Exclusive Evening Tour which offers a behind-the-ropes experience in the State Apartments, tours run during August and December.

Christmas is a magical time to visit Windsor Castle: the State Apartments are decorated with trees, lights and garlands, showing how the festive season has been celebrated by past royal families.

OPENING TIMES & FURTHER INFORMATION

WINDSOR CASTLE

The Castle is open throughout the year with the exception of Good Friday. Christmas Day and Boxing Day and royal events. Windsor Castle is busiest immediately after opening and throughout the morning. Arrival after midday is recommended. As Windsor Castle is a working royal palace opening arrangements and access to various areas of the Castle may be subject to change at short notice. Please check before planning your visit. For general information and advance tickets telephone +44 (0)303 123 7304 or book online at www.rct.uk. Guided tours of the Castle Precincts introduce Windsor's history and the Castle's role today. They depart at regular intervals from the Admissions Centre and are included in the ticket price. An audio tour is available in English, French, German, Spanish, Italian, Japanese, Chinese (Mandarin), Brazilian Portuguese and Russian. Conquer the Tower Tours are available to individuals in August and September. Frogmore House

Set amidst the extensive Home Park of Windsor Castle, Frogmore House is surrounded by fine and picturesque gardens. The house dates from the 1680s and was purchased for Queen Charlotte in 1792. Here The Queen was able to indulge her love of botany and laid out the garden with many rare and unusual plants.

At one time the house was the home of Queen Victoria's mother, the Duchess of Kent. After her death, her son-in-law, Prince Albert, commissioned the building of an elegant mausoleum to hold her remains. Queen Victoria was particularly fond of Frogmore's peaceful ambience and it became her favourite retreat. Victoria and Albert's love of Frogmore led them to break with tradition and build a much larger and grander mausoleum for themselves. Favoured also by King George V and Queen Mary, they used Frogmore for entertaining during Ascot Week. Today with its handsome house and tranquil gardens, it is easy to imagine the love Frogmore inspired in its former residents.





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London's Country Estate

The stretch of the mighty River Thames to the west of London has long been an escape from the capital for the privileged: the Romans constructed villas long the fertile banks and later it became a rural escape for the monarchy. In the Victorian era, wealthy industrialists built Neoclassical villas along the river and it was much frequented by Londoners on day trips. The towns and villages of the Royal Borough are still prized and largely unspoilt and this remains the perfect place for, as it says in *The Wind in the* Willows, 'messing about in boats'. Here we take you on a 20-mile Thames trip, from Hurley east to Runnymede.

HURLEY, BISHAM AND COOKHAM


The river has always been central to the history of Hurley with records of a ford going back to the 6th century. Here you'll find the Olde Bell Inn which, dating from the 12th century, is one of the oldest pubs in England.

The dense woods at Bisham provide a dramatic backdrop to its historical buildings. The best-known sight in the village is Bisham Abbey, actually a 13thcentury manor house built by the Knights Templar.

Heading downstream you reach Cookham, a beautiful Thames retreat, Prior to the First World War Cookham was a rural community almost cut off from the outside world. The High Street contained a forge, a baker, a butcher and a chemist, and the local brewery was down School Lane. Today the High Street has a lovely selection of pubs, restaurants and independent retailers making it well worth a visit.

Iconic and immediately recognisable images of Cookham can be seen at the Stanley Spencer Gallery at the top of the High Street. One of the greatest British artists of the 20th century, Sir Stanley Spencer was born in the village in 1891. The youngest but one child in a large, spirited and talented family, Stanley and his siblings were all taught to play a musical instrument by "Pa" - a self-styled "Professor of Music". The family would gather after mealtimes to hear him read great literature and Bible stories and he made sure the house was full of books, music and conversation. Stanley and his younger brother Gilbert both became professional artists. Stanley worked ceaselessly through the first half of the 20th century and many of his paintings grew from ideas prompted by memories of his early life in the village and those family Bible readings, with works set in familiar Cookham places. A visit to the gallery is highly recommended followed by a walk around the village in the footsteps of the genius himself. A village he regarded as a "Holy Suburb of Heaven".







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MAIDENHEAD

From Cookham the river flows towards Boulter's Lock at Maidenhead, immortalised in Edward John Gregory's painting Boulter's Lock, (Ascot Sunday Afternoon) (1895), a busy Renoir-esque scene of boats and day trippers. Ray Mill Island, accessed via a pretty bridge over the lock, is a tranguil spot, the peace only broken by the roar of the weir at the far end of the island. The beech woods that rise steeply on the east bank of the river here are part of the Cliveden Estate. Set on the cliffs 200 feet above the Thames, Cliveden was once the home of Lady Astor; later in its history it was the scene of an incident that sparked the Profumo scandal of the 1960s. The house is now a hotel, surrounded by nearly 400 acres of National Trust gardens and woodland including a splendid parterre, a water garden and winding woodland paths.

Edwardian Maidenhead had a risqué atmosphere as somewhere where Londoners came to let their hair down, a reputation that continued well into the 1960s and beyond.

Today the town – the largest in the royal borough – still has the charm that earned it the name "Jewel of the Thames", but has shed its decadent image, retaining just a touch of glamour thanks to several resident media and show business personalities.


Don't miss Isambard Kingdom Brunel's famous brickbuilt Sounding Arch, which carries the rail line over the Thames just downstream of Maidenhead Bridge. A technical wonder now as then, the arch was the setting for Turner's lyrical and dynamic painting Rain, Steam, Speed (1844).



Notable among Maidenhead residents are William Henry Grenfell, otherwise known as Lord Desborough, and Sir Nicholas Winton who lived most of his life in Pinkneys Green.

Lord Desborough became a Knight of the Order of the Garter in 1928. He was a Member of Parliament before being raised to the House of Lords and served as High Steward of Maidenhead. William was a writer and war correspondent, and also a dedicated sportsman – he twice rowed for Oxford in the Boat Race, including in the 'dead heat' race of 1877. He climbed the Matterhorn three times, and was President of the MCC and the Lawn Tennis Association. He was heavily involved in organising the 1908 London Olympics, being the President of the organising committee. He was a generous benefactor of the town and many places are named after him.

Sir Nicholas Winton was a remarkable man who masterminded the rescue of children destined for concentration camps in Nazi-occupied Czechoslovakia. In total he helped smuggle 669, mainly Jewish, children on the eve of the Second World War. They were transported to Britain and rehomed. A statue of Sir Nicholas stands on platform 3 of Maidenhead railway station. Similar statues can be found at Liverpool Street station in London and Prague's main railway station. His astonishing achievement only came to light many years after the war; he was knighted for services to humanity in 2003 and in 2014, on his 105th birthday he received the Order of the White Lion, the Czech Republic's highest honour. The Sir Nicholas Winton Memorial Garden, at Oaken Grove Park, Maidenhead was officially opened in 2017 by the Prime Minister and Maidenhead MP. the Rt Hon Theresa May.

BRAY

Downstream from Maidenhead the attractive houses and period cottages of Bray cluster around the old Church of St Michael. One former vicar in the 16th century was Simon Alwyn, known as the Turncoat Vicar of Bray due to his swerving attempts to stay on the right side of politics. He is buried in the churchyard his story is told in the Hinds Head restaurant.

The village has achieved modern day worldwide acclaim due the Michelin stars acquired by its resident chefs, the most famous of whom is culinary experimenter Heston Blumenthal. In this quaint village there are seven stars - three at the Waterside Inn, three at the Fat Duck and another at The Hinds Head.

A famous hotel not far from the village centre is the Monkey Island Hotel, named after the islet in the Thames on which it stands. The name of the island is thought to come from the painted monkeys pictured fishing and



shooting on the hotel ceiling. However, it was originally Monk's Eyot (Island) and was used by the monastics from the nearby Merton Priory at Amerden. In 1744 the 3rd Duke of Marlborough had a fishing lodge built there for use when attending the Kit-Kat Club at Down Place, Water Oakley on the outskirts of Windsor, hence the monkey paintings by Andieu de Clermont. Some people, however, say they represent the pet monkey of George III who was banished here during his mad fits. The building was converted into a hotel in 1840 and has always been popular with high society. H.G. Wells and his lover. Rebecca West, were frequent visitors, Edward VII and Queen Alexandra were also particularly fond of the place.





WINDSOR, ETON AND DATCHET

As you approach Windsor from Bray the riverbanks offer the most stunning views of Windsor Castle. The Round Tower dominates the skyline and you can easily imagine William the Conqueror's original wooden

fortress looming large above the water protecting the town from invasion.

For hundreds of years Windsor existed primarily to house courtiers, the garrison and their families and visitors. The real expansion of the town didn't happen until Queen Victoria's reign and the coming of the railwavs.

On the opposite bank of the Thames, Eton has been a settlement since Saxon times although Roman and Celtic remains suggest an even earlier origin. The town quickly grew along the present High Street during the Middle Ages in response to the growth of

Windsor. The river was never seen as a barrier and Eton flourished due to fish farming. The stones used to build Eton College Chapel, the spires of which you can see from the river, were conveyed here by barge. Today of course Eton is famous for its boys' school, founded in 1440 by Henry VI. Then aged 18, he was a shy and peace-loving man who not only founded the school but also created a centre of pilgrimage, modelling the new college on Winchester. The school buildings dominate the north of the town but there is much to discover if



you take a stroll from the bridge along the High Street and back. Don't miss an original marker for the first-ever modern marathon route from Windsor to London from the 1908 London Olympics, or the metal steps on the road side of the 1717 wall enabling the boys to climb up to watch the frenzy of the Wall Game taking place below. You'll love Sir Anthony Gormley's Edge II statue attached to Common Lane House and Timbralls where James Bond creator, Ian Fleming, lived during his time at Eton. Coincidentally the lamp post outside is numbered 007!

As the Thames widens and grows in strength, it brings you to the attractive village of Datchet, the inspiration for Sir Izaak Walton who wrote The Compleat Angler. Shakespeare certainly knew Datchet, which was mentioned in The Merry Wives of Windsor, along with Datchet Mead where Falstaff was dumped into a ditch by the Thames. To commemorate Queen Victoria's Golden Jubilee in 1887 the oak tree was planted in the middle of the village; a neighbouring tree was planted for her Diamond Jubilee.

The two world wars affected Datchet as they did every village and the war memorial, erected in the 1920s, is a particularly fine one.

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




Dorney Court

This magnificent brick and timber Tudor mansion is still privately owned by the family who has occupied it for nearly 500 years, the interiors crammed with paintings, panelling and lacquer furniture. Now the village enjoys a new status as home to Dorney Lake which hosted the rowing and canoeing events during the London 2012 Olympic and Paralympic Games. The house is open to visitors over bank holiday weekends in May and all of August. Groups are welcome during the rest of the year by appointment only.



Stanley Spencer Gallery

- one of Britain's most influential artists

Sir Stanley Spencer, English painter and fellow of the Royal Academy, was born in Cookham. The Stanley Spencer Gallery, a former Methodist Chapel he attended as a child, holds over 100 of his works. Although many are biblical in theme and feature local villagers, Spencer was a commissioned war artist and his works also cover army life and shipbuilding on the River Clyde. Buried in the village churchyard, he once referred to Cookham as "a village in heaven". A 2011 poll of 1,000 British painters and sculptors named Spencer as one of the top 10 most influential British artists of all time. Open all year (Tues-Sun from April - Nov and Thurs -Sun from Nov – Mar).



Taplow Court

- home to sporting legends, war poets and Buddhists

Taplow Court is a mid-19th-century mansion set high above the Thames near Maidenhead. William Grenfell, Lord Desborough, known as 'the best all-round sportsman' of his time and President of the 1908 London Olympics, lived here from 1866 to 1945. His eldest son Julian was one of the First World War poets. Today Taplow Court is the home of SGI-UK, a lay Buddhist society. The house is open to the public on certain Sundays during the summer months. On these days you may picnic in the 85 acres of grounds. Guided tours of the house and cream teas are also available on these days.

Waltham Place Estate

Berkshire's best kept secret

Waltham Place Farm is a 220-acre organic and biodynamic farm of which 50 acres is woodland, a lake, ornamental and kitchen gardens. Over 20 years it has matured into a thriving environment and a small farm shop sells home-grown produce including fruit and vegetables and home-reared meat. The tea rooms and farm shop open May-September, on a Wednesday from 10am to 4pm. The gardens can be viewed on Wednesdays regular "Walks with the Gardener" tours at 11am & 2pm in aid of the National Garden Scheme Day. Groups can arrange a visit on Tuesdays and



Eton College Museums



On Sundays from 2.30pm to 5pm Eton College opens the doors of three marvellous museums to the general public. The Natural History Museum has more than 16,000 specimens and exploring themes including Thames Valley wildlife, biodiversity, evolution, and ecology. The Museum of Antiquities contains, amongst other things, a remarkable collection of Egyptian artefacts, a generous bequest from old boy Major William Joseph Myers to the Head Master of Eton College at the end of the 19th century. The Museum of Eton Life brings alive various aspects of the Eton experience across six centuries. It is housed in an undercroft below College Hall, a space that was used to store beer for the scholarship boys until the early 20th century.

Enjoy a luxurious break and stay in one of the region's upmarket country house hotels, which offer spa and fitness facilities for a spot of pampering and pummelling. If you fancy being in the outdoors, a round of golf might suit: the area is home to some of the finest championship golf courses including Wentworth, Sunningdale and Stoke Park.

Many local hotels have their own 9-hole courses or arrangements for guests to play at nearby clubs.

And of course Windsor is synonymous with all things horsey, from a trek through the park to a round of polo. The Royal Windsor Horse Show is very popular, while a day at the races in Ascot is synonymous with style, offering unparalleled racing. Although best known for flat racing, proudly hosting the Royal Ascot Meeting each June, the racecourse also hosts jump meetings from November to April. Whether you want to book a fine-dining package with a champagne reception or organise a day out with a group of friends, there's something for just about everyone at Ascot.

Set in 165 acres of scenic countryside on the banks of the Thames and overlooked by Windsor Castle, Royal Windsor Racecourse makes for a memorable outing. The first meeting at Royal Windsor was held in 1866 but the local area has links with the sport dating back to the time of Henry VIII. There are now 26 race days a year from April to October, with regular Monday evening fixtures and theme nights with live music during the summer. To make your journey part of the whole experience, take a boat to the racecourse from Windsor promenade.

For trekking and lessons, the riding schools in Windsor and Maidenhead will guide you through glorious English countryside, including across the historic Great Park.

A less energetic but wonderfully romantic way to explore Windsor and the surrounding countryside is to hire a horse-drawn carriage, available from the top of the Long Walk in Windsor and at The Savill Garden in the Great Park.

The sport of kings – polo – features heavily in the sporting calendar here, with three top-class clubs in Windsor and Ascot including Guards Polo Club founded by Prince Philip. At the Royal County of Berkshire Polo Club you can actually participate in the game: their coaching method enables a beginner to play with confidence quickly. Part of the Dorchester Collection, exclusive Coworth Park is the UK's only hotel with its own polo field and equestrian centre (as well as gorgeous spa facilities). Guests can learn the sport and enjoy other country pursuits such as a hack round the estate.









Cycling and walking are encouraged in the Royal Borough, with 300km of public rights of way. The national cycle network offers a safe and attractive route through parts of Maidenhead and Windsor. Windsor Cycle Hire has bikes available for a half or full day or longer if you're having fun!

Take to the water in your own cruiser and you'll see just how the other half live. The riverbanks house a fascinating mix of stunning private homes, hotels with intriguing history and bustling marinas. Stop off for a picnic or enjoy a leisurely lunch at one of a choice of restaurants between Runnymede and Marlow. A perfect escape on a lazy summer's day. If you simply want to spend your break relaxing the Borough's spas create the perfect environment to melt away stresses and strains. With a tranquil atmosphere, exceptional facilities and products and treatments to indulge your senses you'll leave renewed and revitalised. For the more energetic, purpose-built gyms, dance studios, tennis courts and running tracks abound. With the freedom to do your own thing or join an organised session, there's plenty to get hearts pumping and raise fitness levels every day of the week.

After all that fresh air, exploring and pampering a perfect getaway wouldn't be complete without a special night out. Why not combine an early supper with an evening of cultural entertainment at Windsor's Theatre Royal or one of the borough's arts centres?

With everything from opera to comedy and contemporary dance to art movies there's always something different to enjoy. Alternatively start the night with cocktails on a riverside terrace before a romantic dinner for two – Windsor and the surrounding area is blessed with some of the best restaurants in the country and there is a wealth of old inns in the towns and villages where you can retreat for traditional English pub grub.

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
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

MOUNTAIN BIKING

Swinley Forest is one of the UK's top destination trail centres with 24km of waymarked, purpose-built mountain bike trails and single tracks that ebb and flow to the forest's contours. There are three levels of trail within the forest which are Green (1km), Blue (10km) and Red (13km) so you are sure to find a trail that suits you. The steep climbs, gnarly single tracks and slippery descents of the Red trail are a playground for advanced mountain bikers with good off-road riding skills. With varying gradients and technical difficulty, this trail promises to keep you on your toes. Cut in and out of the pine forest, master the manoeuvres of single track routes and hold your own on the 'F1' drop!

BUNGEE JUMPING

Stand Up Paddleboard or SUP is a new and rapidly growing water sport with its routes firmly in surfing culture. 



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Beginner's to Eton College

You might know a little about Eton College: possibly that it is an exclusive boarding school for boys only and that Princes William and Harry were educated there. But nearly 600 years after its foundation there is a fascinating history to discover.











1 Eton College Library 2 Eton College boys 3 Eton College boys 4 HRH Prince Harry 5 Eddie Redmayne OBE, Actor Credit: AP:ASSOCIATED PRESS In 1440 Henry VI founded "The King's College of Our Lady of Eton beside Windsor" and a year later, King's College, Cambridge which was to be supplied with scholars from Eton. 70 "worthy boys" were provided with free education. Life in the fifteenth

century was sometimes harsh, with some scholars having to share beds in Long Chamber, waking at 5am, chanting prayers whilst they dressed and starting work in Lower School by 6am. In the early days all teaching was in Latin and if they spoke English they were flogged! Today, the school is a very modern institution whilst retaining its distinctive 'school dress' and has a fame that is second to none. From the 70 scholars for whom Henry provided, Eton College has expanded to over 1,300 boys aged from 13 to 18. Entry is by competitive examination and 1 in 5 boys receive financial help to enable them to be educated there. 1 in 10 boys at Eton is from overseas. To go to school here you just need to be a boy and to pass an examination.

Glorious Gardens Beautiful Landscapes

Visitors to Windsor and the surrounding area may be surprised to find how much deep and beautiful countryside they can easily access. To the north is more than 1000 acres of National Trust land, while to the south is the vast sweep of the Crown Estate: all 4800 acres of it. Glorious gardens, parks and open spaces offer space to run around, plenty of fresh air and always an abundance of colour and interest no matter what the season.

MAIDENHEAD & BRAY

The Thames at Maidenhead is one of the many attractions of the town, and you can make forays along its banks to the attractive small settlements of Cookham, Marlow and Bray. There's a landing stage on the river for visiting the National Trust's Cliveden Estate, where restoration work has restored the gardens to their former bountiful glory. The celebrated bedding displays on the Parterre, originally designed by Victorian gardener John Fleming, have been recreated and include sixteen formal beds with box hedging and exuberant yew topiary. Two floral displays a year provide rich colour from spring to September. The impressive Cliveden Maze is a recreation of a Maze designed and built for Lord Astor, the former owner of Cliveden, in 1894. Don't worry. Although the maze is more complicated than it first looks, most people solve the it in less than 20 minutes. Also in Maidenhead, the Braywick Nature Centre is a community project promoting awareness of the nature with events, walks and talks. It's located in an old stable block, and includes the Garden Café.

RUNNYMEDE

This verdant spot is the site of one of the most significant moments in British history. It was here at the ancient 'meeting meadow' that King John sealed the Magna Carta in 1215, establishing the principle of constitutional monarchy and affirming the individual's right to justice and liberty. Nearby you can walk the acre of land given to the USA by Her Majesty The Queen where a memorial has been raised to John F Kennedy. High on the hill is another poignant memorial, this one to the men and women of the air forces of the British Commonwealth who lost their lives in World War Two. This most peaceful place offers visitors a place to contemplate, as well as enjoy magnificent views across the green sweep of the Thames Valley. Across the river you can explore ancient Ankerwycke, which shelters the tranquil ruins of the Benedictine priory and a 2,500 year old yew tree.

The Jurors is an artwork by Hew Locke for Runnymede, marking 800 years since the sealing of Magna Carta on







this ancient meadow. The Jurors is formed of 12 bronze chairs, each decorated with images and symbols relating to past and ongoing struggles for freedom, rule of law and equal rights. The Jurors is not a memorial but rather an artwork which challenges visitors to consider the ongoing significance and influences of Magna Carta.

WINDSOR GREAT PARK

The Long Walk that cuts from Windsor Castle through the park to the equestrian statue on Snow Hill is aptly named: you'll need to set aside a few hours to explore even a corner of the wonderful greenery on offer here, from stately oak trees to the shimmering lake of Virginia Water. The optimum time for a visit is late May and early June, when the rhododendrons and azaleas are dense with bright blooms.

Measuring around 24km in circumference, this is much more than your average park. Landmarks include a lofty totem pole, an 18th-century ornamental waterfall, Roman ruins (bizarrely imported from Libya by George III) and a towering obelisk. There are some wonderful formal gardens and long avenues of trees, but you'll find that large areas are thickly wooded and even untamed, while some sections are cultivated as farmland. Tall beeches and great oaks predominate, some dating back as far as the Norman conquest. The elegant grace-andfavour houses dotted throughout the park give you a sense of how the other half live – don't miss the sight of noble steeds and their riders on the polo ground. If this inspires you to jump on a horse there are a couple of stables where you can be taken out on rather more sedate escorted trips round the park.

The park was enclosed for boar and deer hunting in the thirteenth century, and in 1580 Lord Burleigh ordered that it should be stocked with trees to replace timber lost during the war with Spain. The famous Long Walk was planted by Charles II in 1680. And it was here that George III famously leapt from his carriage, addressing an oak tree as the King of Prussia. The monarch, known as Farmer George, brought agriculture to the former hunting ground. Going further back in history, legend has it that the park has been haunted for one thousand years by Herne the Hunter, who you'll recognize from his stag antlers, black stallion and the hounds that race at his feet. Don't say we didn't warn you.

Legend aside, if you have one focus for your visit make it the Savill Garden, 35 acres of ornamental garden and woodland, including National Collections and rare international species. Spring in the garden is heralded by hosts of daffodils and the bright blooms of magnolias, rhododendrons and azaleas. In summer the herbaceous borders bring more bright colour, contrasting with the pastel shades of the Golden Jubilee Garden. The autumn colours are a glory to behold, and even in winter the garden has an austere beauty.

Blooms in the Rose Garden are chosen for their scent and repeat flowering, with 2,500 plants in unusual interlocking crescent borders. The Queen Elizabeth Temperate House is designed for tender plants, including mahonias from the National Collections. When you've wandered enough, visit the Savill Building with its award-winning grid-shell roof made from sustainable Windsor wood. Here you can have a restorative homemade cake and an English cuppa.

Elsewhere in Windsor, take a wander through the riverside Alexandra Gardens, created in 1902 when they were planted with London plane trees to celebrate the Coronation of Edward VII and his Queen, Alexandra. You'll also see a bandstand, and the Dyson Memorial Fountain, which honours a 19th-century piano dealer and former mayor.

Where to

Shopping in the Royal Borough means variety, choice and quality.

Scattered through the area's towns and villages are a host of specialist retailers ready to give you advice on their products and help you make an informed purchase. The area's main towns, Maidenhead, Windsor and Eton, offer their own range of independent stores, as well as top High Street names and international brands.

WINDSOR

Elegant and distinctly well-heeled, the Royal Borough offers a wealth of good shopping opportunities, whether you're after original handmade items, vintage gems, quality high-street goods or lush plants for your house or garden.

At the heart of Windsor is Windsor Royal Shopping, a mostly covered area that occupies the site of an 1850s railway station: you can still see Queen Victoria's royal waiting room. Here you can shop for upmarket brands such as Le Creuset and Jo Malone in a continental café setting, and you might also be intrigued by Artique, an art gallery with a consultancy service. From Windsor Royal Shopping, steps lead down to Windsor Yards, a pedestrian-friendly collection of good high street stores, including a branch of Lakeland where you can invest in the latest cooking gizmo.

Peascod Street, the car-free road that runs down the hill directly opposite the castle, has more high-quality high street brands including Superdry and Seasalt. You might want to pop into vintage store Really Me at no 44 which sells clothing, accessories, furniture, bric-a-brac, books and vinyl and also helps fund Thames Hospice. Lower Peascod Street and St Leonard's Road are where Windsorians love to shop. Here you'll find a part of town where cosy cafés meet traditional crafts and fine foods, with a bit of fashion thrown in for good measure.

The High Street, Thames Street and the 17th-century Guildhall enjoy a scenic location beneath the castle, and specialist shops entice visitors with local jewellery, pottery and woollens, as well as royal regalia in the form of souvenirs. Jersey Pearl, in the aptly nicknamed Crooked House next to the Guildhall, combines pearls sourced directly from pearl farmers with Britain's finest design talent to create jewellery with the perfect combination of value and desirability.

ETON

Stroll from here across the bridge over the Thames and you'll come to Eton High Street, leading towards the famous college – you can't miss the pupils in their chalk-stripe trousers, blazers and waistcoats. Aside from the school, Eton is renowned for its art and antique shops and appealing small family businesses, including jewellers, bookshops and gift shops. On the mile-long strip of shops between the Thames and Eton College you can browse for original paintings, prints and photography, handmade jewellery, haute couture and leather goods. There are even bespoke tailors, as well as plenty of traditional pubs and eating places to stop and refuel.

MAIDENHEAD

Neighbouring Maidenhead has a good range of well known High Street names complimented by a wide variety of independent and specialist stores for you to explore. Step off the High Street and you'll find some hidden gems for that special something.

The Nicholsons Shopping Centre offers a selection of over 60 stores including well known names such as Next, WH Smiths, Argos, Robert Dyas Topshop/Topman and much more all under one roof.

Maidenhead boasts a wide variety of regular and visiting markets including continental, farmers' and arts markets offering shoppers a unique experience.

FURTHER AFIELD

At the other end of the scale, the picture-postcard villages of Ascot, Cookham, Sunninghill and Sunningdale offer fine boutiques, arts and crafts stores, florists and wine merchants.

The Royal Borough is a truly tasty destination, lending its name to hearty Victorian delights such as Brown Windsor Soup and the crowd-pleasing Eton Mess. There's a wide range of restaurants, bars and cafés for all palates and budgets. But before expanding on its variety, we'd like to turn your attention to the riverside village of Bray immediately to the west. Unlikely as it may seem, this is one of the culinary capitals of the UK, if not the planet, boasting seven Michelin stars!

First up is The Waterside Inn (run by the Roux family), which has been turning out impeccable and sophisticated French dishes since 1972. Then there's Heston Blumenthal's outrageously- experimental Fat Duck made famous by offering such delights as snail porridge and whisky wine gums and once voted the best restaurant in the world. Blumenthal has taken over the two local pubs – the 15th-century Hinds Head (now with its own Michelin star) and the low-beamed 14th century Crown at Bray. And if all this wasn't enough, Caldesi in Campagna offers the finest of Tuscan cooking on the banks of the Thames at Bray.

Back in Windsor, there's fantastic culinary and cultural diversity on offer. Al Fassia is a stylish Moroccan restaurant decked out with wooden shutters and rich fabrics; they serve homemade tagines, couscous and lots of vegetarian dishes such as zaalouk (grilled aubergines with tomato) and mangoub (broad bean stew).

Always popular for breakfast, lunch or supper you'll find Bill's Restaurant, Café Rouge, Bella Italia and Wagamama's in

and around Windsor Royal Station. At The Real Greek you'll find delicious Mediterranean food and a wonderfully friendly atmosphere. Windsor Grill on St Leonard's Road is a swanky little restaurant with an elegant interior and unpretentious British grill menu; this discreet restaurant is loved by locals and visitors alike.

For great British pub grub, traditional real ales and fabulous cocktails head to The Boatman with its enviable waterfront location or The Royal Windsor nestling against the mighty walls of Windsor Castle. Just over the bridge in Eton you've not had the real burgers until you've had the Flaming Cow experience! At The Eton Mess you'll find a great British menu with locally sourced ingredients, an extensive range of Gins, craft and local beers.

Away from Windsor, Stanley Spencer's scenic birthplace Cookham has some good options: Malik's is an award winning Indian tandoori place, and Bel & The Dragon, located in one of the oldest coaching inns in England offers modern British cuisine. Coppa Club in Maidenhead focusses on thoughtful, unfussy, European food from small plates and snacks to grilled mains, sourdough pizzas and healthy salads.

There's another Michelin star to catch at Restaurant Coworth Park within Dorchester Collection's secret hideaway amongst rolling fields and ancient woodland in Ascot. Yet another Michelin star twinkles brightly at The Crown, Burchetts Green in Maidenhead. Well-sourced ingredients from France and some of the UK's best independent food and wine producers, ensure a wholly English-French experience.

Also in Ascot you'll find the modern Ascot Grill and The Stag pub where you can enjoy Gloucestershire Old Spot Sausages and cask ales, while the Belvedere Arms in Sunninghill is renowned for its Sunday roast.

Visitors going really upmarket can check out the fabulous restaurants located within luxury country-house hotels such as The Runnymede on Thames and The Oakley Court.







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

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

Most people associate Windsor with drifting herds of deer and the glorious symmetry of the castle. But the area has a rich musical and theatrical tradition and this, combined with two innovative arts centres and some attractive ancient pubs, provides visitors with the potential of a great night out.

LIVE PERFORMANCE & FILM

Windsor's major arts venue is the Edwardian Theatre Royal which sits directly across from the castle. The advent of the movies in the late twenties saw the building turned into the picture house, but in 1938 it returned to its theatrical roots to become a great repertory theatre. It helped launch the career of Sir Peter Hall who went on to found the Royal Shakespeare Company, and is known as a try-out space for future West End productions.

The Theatre Royal has been run by impresario Bill Kenwright since 1997 and features an eclectic programme of musicals, light opera, live music and kids' shows. And if you're in Windsor in December or January, be sure to dip your toes into the bawdy, gaudy tradition of British pantomime, complete with song, dance, cross-dressing and glorious confusion.

Just a fifteen-minute walk from Windsor and Eton Riverside Station is The Old Court, a hothouse for movies, live music, theatre, dance and exhibitions. For evening drinks choose from the range of champagnes in the café/bar, where you can dance alongside the digital jukebox.

If you're in the area and looking for a great night out which includes a live gig, be it a band or an acoustic duo, check out what The Old Ticket Hall has to offer. As the name suggests, this space, which is now utilised for live music, was once the original ticket office for the Riverside train station in Windsor. The quirky Grade II listed building still boasts many of its

original features! Windsor was home to several influential live music bars. The Ricky Tick Club in the mid-sixties hosted many important acts such as The Rolling Stones, The Who, Jimi Hendrix, Pink Floyd and Cream. Then more recently, The Old Trout in the nineties played Oasis, Blur, Supergrass, Suede and many more. Today, The Old Ticket Hall proudly promotes itself as the only venue in Windsor that is dedicated to live music five days a week.

Neighbouring Maidenhead has an arts centre too, Norden Farm, which is less rustic than it sounds, showing low-budget releases alongside mainstream movies; it is also a venue for touring dance, drama, comedy, music and exhibitions. Enjoy a pre-show dinner in the Café Bar, order interval drinks, drop in for a cappuccino or evening meal.

Smokey Joes Roadhouse is a live music venue located right in the middle of Maidenhead Town Centre. The venue has three distinct areas. The main room has a great relaxed, fun atmosphere, and is extremely unpretentious. There is also a covered and heated rooftop balcony area with seating ideal for smokers and those that just want to have a quiet moment; and a luxurious VIP lounge bar complete with boothed seating and a waterfall centrepiece.

Again, in the centre of Maidenhead, you'll find the eight-screen Odeon cinema with state-of-the-art digital sound and body-sculpted chairs to enjoy all the latest film releases

PUBS AND CLUBS

The Royal Borough features a great selection of pubs, from slick places to traditional old inns, where real ale and half timbers are the setting for an evening out. The brick-built Two Brewers at the Cambridge Gate entrance to the Great Park in Windsor is one of the best. This 17th-century former coffee house is adorned with hanging baskets in summer, while in winter you can enjoy the log fire.

You'll also find a log fire at Henry VI in Eton, though the pub has recently had a sympathetic makeover with a funky frontage. There's a courtyard garden, and Sunday roasts are on the menu as well as traditional hearty bar food.

The riverside village of Bray to the west of Windsor is home to the half-timbered 16th-century Crown at Bray; it's owned by Heston Blumenthal, so as you'd expect food is a highlight. Here though, pub grub rather than wildly experimental food is the order of the day.

Simpler food is to the fore at the Hand & Flowers in Maidenhead, where you can dine on beef and ale pie, burgers, scampi and pizza while Jagz in Ascot is at the funkier end of things, with band competitions, an acoustic café, DJ nights and live jazz.

In the heart of Windsor by the railway station, the Goswell Arches house a collection of drinking and clubbing venues, from The Fuzzy Bear with its comedy and cocktails to the relaxed friendly atmosphere and fantastic music at the Scotch Bar. This is the perfect place for a great night out!

Parking for Disabled Visitors

ON-STREET PARKING

Blue Badge holders can park in shared use bays (resident and pay and display), on-street pay and display areas and limited waiting areas for the maximum time as displayed on the signage present. There is a maximum stay of three hours in any on-street disabled parking bay. Blue Badge holders are not permitted to park in resident only bays, taxi bays, bus stops, loading bays/zones and clearways.

Blue Badge holders can park free of charge in any borough car park when displaying a valid Blue Badge. Please adhere to the maximum stated time for each car park as outlined on the tariff board and ensure your vehicle is parked within the bay markings.




